





Language Requirements



Courses taught in Spanish

If you who want to register **courses taught in Spanish**, and your mother language is not Spanish, you must have an **Advanced level of Spanish (B1 MCER / CEFR)**. *A Spanish Placement Test will be provided before the selection of courses.*



Courses taught in English

If you who want to register **courses taught in English**, and your mother language is not English, must have an **Advance level of English (B1 or equivalent)**. *Proof of Language Proficiency will be required before the selection of courses.*

Facts About Classes at Tec de Monterrey

- Each course provides different amounts of credits.
- Class size averages 30 students.
- Homework and projects are assigned regularly. Part of the assignments and projects includes teamwork.
- Minimum passing grade of 70/100.
- Attendance to classes is essential.
- The evaluation of the courses is comprehensive, so recurring absences from classes can have an impact on your final grade, with the risk of failing the course.
- During class work and participation are done, which are part of the final grade.

Preliminary course catalog

In the preliminary course catalog, you'll find a **list of courses that may be available during upcoming semesters**.

It also includes information on courses offered in previous terms.

You can filter the course list by language of instruction (English or Spanish), campus, school, and department. **If you need more detailed information about a specific course, you can view its syllabus.**

Understanding the courses

Tec de Monterrey courses' code contains bits of information, such as the course level and the area of study. This information is particularly relevant for your **learning agreement and course selection**. Here's an example of how to read a course code:

Course code
MT 1 001 B

Course name
Marketing Insight Develop Strategies

- **The letters (at the beginning of the code)** specify to which area of knowledge the course belongs (For example: MT is for Marketing).
- **The numbers*** indicate the semester in which our TEC students register the course, for example:
 - Code that **contains 1000** are **first level courses** offered during the first semesters of a bachelor (Semesters 1 to 3).
 - Code that **contains 2000** are **intermediate or advanced leve courses** offered during the middle of a bachelor (Semesters 3 to 6).
 - Code that **contains 3000** are **advanced leve courses** offered during the last semester of a bachelor (Semesters 6 to 8).
- **The letter at the end** of some courses stands for a **block or a concentration** (B for blocks, C for Concentrations).

*Note. A Tec de Monterrey bachelor is usually 8 to 9 semesters long.

Classes and Schedule

How a Tec semester schedule can look like

Usually Tec de Monterrey semesters are composed by courses, blocks and Tec Weeks, and is divided into 3 cycles that last 5 weeks each.

- **Courses** are like a traditional course, and that can last 5, 10, or 15 weeks depending on the subject and credits.
- **Blocks** are courses that contain challenges connected to reality and theoretical modules. You can only participate in one block per period.
- **TEC Weeks** are weeks between cycles where you can participate in an activity or experience designed to develop different skills. **Tec Weeks are not mandatory for international students.**

In the case of a **Concentration**, this specialization is equivalent to several blocks and courses that runs through the whole semester.



Accommodation

Tec de Monterrey offers different housing alternatives to fulfill and adapt to any needs, budget, and expectations.



Residence Halls

With different types of buildings and amenities, all the options are equipped to satisfy the housing needs of students. They have 24/7 security, and the facilities include lobby with TV, cinema and communal kitchen inside the dorms.

Option available at campus: Guadalajara, Monterrey, Puebla, and Querétaro.



Host Family

Different families are ready to open their home and hearts with the well-known Mexican warmth and hospitality. Includes 3 meals per day and basic services.

Option available at campus: Ciudad de México, Guadalajara, Monterrey, and Querétaro.



Independent Housing

You can find a variety of houses, apartments, and rooms in student houses around the campuses.

Option available at campus: Ciudad de México, Guadalajara, Monterrey, Puebla, Querétaro, and Santa Fe.

Health Insurance Policy



Safety first

One of Tec de Monterrey main concerns is the health and safety of all our community; therefore, it is **MANDATORY** for all international students to **be covered by an international health insurance plan**.

Minimum coverage required

Medical expenses in case of sickness/accident	\$210,000 USD
Medical evacuation in case of sickness/accident	\$210,000 USD
Repatriation of remains	\$50,000 USD
Travel expenses for a companion	\$4,000 USD

Injuries caused by the amateur practice of a high-risk sport	Included
Injuries caused by a weapon in case of assault or robbery	Included
Guarantee of direct payment	Included

Note. After admission and prior to their arrival in Mexico, you will be required to provide proof of coverage that includes the above minimums.

Application Process



1. Get Nominated (By your home university)

Contact your study abroad advisor at your university and **inform them of your interest in doing an exchange at Tec de Monterrey**.

Note. Let them know about the campus and program of your interest, so they can choose those options on your nomination.



2. Complete the Application Form (After getting nominated)

Once you have been nominated to Tec de Monterrey, you will receive an email with a personal link to fill out the **Application for admission**. You must complete the following steps:

1. Create a username and password
2. Log in and complete the required information in the online application
3. Upload a copy of your current passport.
 - The passport must be in a single file and the information must be legible.
 - Your passport must be valid when you apply and until 7 days minimum after you finish your exchange.

Note.

- If any detail of your application requires additional review, we will contact you.
- If you are applying to a particular program, such as double degree, medical clerkships, etc. other documents and/or interviews may be required.



Traveling to Mexico

Visa

The visa required to study in Mexico is defined by the nationality and the time of stay in Mexico.




Non-restricted nationalities

Require an FMM (migratory form obtained upon entry to the country), and do not need a student visa if the stay is for 180 days or less (a semester or summer/winter terms).



Non-restricted nationalities

Require a visa that must be issued at any Mexican consulate or embassy, regardless of the time of stay. To review the list of restricted nationalities, visit: Mexican Immigration Institute website



Staying for more than 180 days?

Any student staying for more than 180 days (for more than one semesters), regardless of the nationality, will require a visa issued at any Mexican consulate before arriving to Mexico.


